Hancock Trips

Disappointment reigned at the dedication of the new George Walton Academy football field as the Bulldogs dropped an error-marred game to John Hancock, 8-0.

Penalties and rain sank the 'Dogs in their first home game in their history. However, if there is to be consolation in a loss, there was in this one. John Hancock came into the game expecting a repeat of last year's 27-6 score and should have gone home a loger

With 11 seniors and a lot of beef on the line and in the backfield. Hancock is thinking championship this year. Friday night, though, the Rebels only penetrated into GWA's half twice. GWA had a pair of scoring runs called back and failed to convert on three other scoring opportunities deep in Rebel territory.

Relying on its air game for 42 yards, John Hancock made its first drive late in the first half. After moving from their own 30 to the GWA 19, Hancock was introduced to a future star. In the first two plays of the series, they lost two yards back to the 21, on third down defensive end Don Holder broke through the power sweep and dropped the Rebel runner for a loss. On the fourth down attempt, the rangy ninth grader dropped 200 lb. Terry Callaway for another two yard loss. This outstanding play allowed the Bulldogs to hang onto their scoreless tie and head back to the dressing room for the half.

It wasn't to last however. Just before the second half kickoff, the rain began to fall. On their opening series the Bulldogs fumbled, giving John Hancock the ball on the GWA 40. Utilizing several personal foul penalties on the 'Dogs, the Rebels were soon in scoring position on the 10. From there senior running back Rickey Wolfe, the Rebel's main threat, rumbled in through the downpour to score the game's only touchdown. On the two point Trouble came on second

pressured quarterback Ronnie Ferrell but tight end Mike Simmons broke free of the coverage and made a onehanded grab of the slippery ball to give John Hancock an 8-0 lead.

The Bulldogs' first chance to score came early in the game as the opportunistic defense forced the first of many Rebel fumbles. Cornerback Huie McMichael, a newcomer, came up and tackled the receiver behind the line forcing a fumble. He recovered the loose ball on the Hancock 37. Hard running by Tony Groves and Jim Evans moved the ball to the eight where the Bulldogs had first and goal. They managed to move to the five but the stiffened Hancock defense would budge no further.

Late in the third quarter, Bulldog standout David McKissick separated a Rebel runner from the ball and claimed the ball for GWA on the Hancock 26. A delay of game penalty moved the Bulldogs back to the 31 but the next play would have nullified that. Quarterback Brad Bradley engineered a perfectly executed sweep play which scored Jim Evans, except for one thing. A yellow flag was lying on the ground. The touchdown was called back for illegal procedure. Hancock forced an interp ception to regain possession.

On the very next play, GWA was back in business. Don Holder recovered a fumble on the Hancock 30. The offense could only punch out five yards, though, before turning it back to the Rebels.

At the ouset of the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs assembled their first real drive of the game. Starting from their own 45 the Bulldogs began to move. Bradley rolled around the end for 13 yards to get the drive started. He then ran for eight vards followed by Evans tough run for another six. A pass completion to Scott Bryant moved the ball to the 26 where a pass interference call took the ball to the 13.



back to the 25. Third down found Holder wide open with room to run but the Hancock defense wouldn't let Bradley set. He overthrew the receiver. Another penalty moved the ball back five more yards. On fourth down Bradley whipped the ball to Groves who rifled a perfect pass downfield to Holder all alone in the endzone, but another flag had been dropped. Offsides nullified that score.

GWA got the ball back on their own 23 but only three minutes were left. Coach Ronald Bradley resorted again to his bag of tricks and almost pulled something out. With 1:31 left and fourth and 13, the Bulldogs went into a shotgun formation Bradley laid the ball into Groves outstretched arms for a first down but the quick back wasn't through. He eluded most of the Hancock team and was racing for the goal when the strain of playing every down caught up to him.

Hearing footsteps behind him he cut back in and gained another five yards to the 20 before he was dragged down. The play covered 60 yards. A personal foul on the Rebels moved it to the 10. Fate struck again as the next pass was intercepted killing the George Walton hopes.

Penalties and the three turnovers killed the Bulldogs in this first game but time should take care of these errors. The team made a superior effort on defense, especially McMichael, Holder, McKissick, Evans and Keith Henderson. McKissick led the team with 20 tackles. McMichael and Holder are both new to the GWA varsity and their presence has improved the team immediately. The offense provided a lot of fireworks and fans coming out this Friday night can expect to se more of those big plays. The bulldogs play Gordon-Ivey, expected to be the toughest opponent this vear.

Evans-Bradley lead GWA win

The George Walton Bulldogs, showing improvement with each game, won their third game in four starts last Friday night. The 38-0 victory over Rutledge

Academy was the Bulldogs' best effort of the season.

GWA forced the Raiders to punt in their first series of the game, and the 'Dogs were in business on their own 40 yardline. Eight plays later the Bulldogs were in the end zone on a beautiful 37 yard run by junior Jim Evans. The 2-point conversion was added by Evans and GWA was off to an 8-0 lead.

On the first play of the second quarter senior Brad Bradley ran 5 yards to pay dirt. Tony Groves ran for the 2-pointer to give the home lads a 16-0 lead. In the third quarter Jim Evans added another TD on a 17 yard run. Evans scored the 2 point PAT for a 24-0 lead.

Later in the same quarter Brad Bradley, running the option play like a real Bulldog, scampered 13 yards to the endzone. Groves added the two-pointer to give the Dogs a 32-0 lead at the end of three quarters.

Early in the 4th quarter, Brad Bradley scored his third touchdown of the game on a six yard run.

Many GWA Bullpups saw action and this helped hold the score to the final margin.

The GWA offense rolled up 370 yards rushing. Jim Evans had 147 yards on 18 carries, Brad Bradley gained 120 yards on 16 attempts, and Tony Groves had 105 yards in 16 carries.

The Bulldog defense held the Raiders to 73 yards rushing and 48 yards passing. The defense, as usual, was led by linebacker David McKissick with 16 tackles. The tough senior is averaging 20

The Bulldog starting offense



NY GROVES, 12, lunges ahead for r produce Friday night against Flint ". He and his teammates shutout the



Taking the handoff 25 yards out, he made one of his awing third-effort runs up the middle, then turned left and scatted to the end zone.

Holder stole the ball from many surrounding defenders for his second score. It was a 27 yarder from QB Brad Bradley.

Bradley scored six points on a one yard run and two up the middle on a PAT. No George Walton Academy write-up would be complete without praising senior tackle David McKissick. David not only made nine tackles, he also scored the last touchdown. In the closing seconds, he was transferred from his line position to runningback. He first carried 16 yards on a good pulling run to the two yard marker, one more on the next snap, and then the final one to the goal line.

David and his defensive teammates held the Commodores to eight yards rushing and 17 passing.


The Bulldogs now sport a 6-3 record and have won the last 6 out of 7.
