The Eagles stole much of the local under from cross-county rival Newton, oring their first two victories over the ams and earning a seat in the Class AAA State Tournament.

Herring, The Covington News Defensive Player of the Year for 2003-04, worked to the point of exhaustion at shutting down opposing guards and served as the foundation for Newton's 2-3 zone defense.

"He did a great job," said Newton head coach Ron Bradley. "His defense just carried us. He was the spirit of our defense. He was one of those guys that played every day, which led to him being named as our
