Newton gets last laug

Scott's reverse lay-in completes improbable comeback for Rams

The Newton High School boys' basketball team found its reprisal Friday night, and it came with an historical comeback attached.

Vincent Scott glided between two defenders and scored on a reverse lay-up with four seconds remaining as the Rams roared back from a 20-point halftime deficit to stun Eastside 59-57 before a standing-roomonly crowd at Newton High School.

Eastside (18-5, 6-2 Region 8-AAAA South) held a 55-41 advantage with 5:49 remaining and squandered it. Newton (17-6, 5-3) scored 18 of the game's final 20 points and took its only lead of the game on Scott's go-ahead lay-up.

"You just don't believe you can come back and win when you're down 20 at halftime," said Newton head coach Ron Bradley. "It's one of the greatest comebacks we've ever been a part of. Our kids wouldn't quit, and I can't tell you how proud I am of them."

Eastside head coach Tommy McWhorter felt helpless in the face of a monumental momentum swing.

"We've never really been in that situation before," McWhorter said. "I've got to take my hat off to Newton. We just didn't seal the deal, and they did. Maybe if I had had 10 timeouts, it would have been different."

Scott poured in 18 points and ripped down 10 rebounds for the Rams, who won for the fourth time in five meetings between the two schools. Jerrell Boswell scored 22 points to lead all scorers, draining six three-pointers in the second half to ignite the improbable Newton comeback.

Still, Eastside had the game in its hands and let it slip away.

The Eagles led 57-44 with 3:35 to go in regulation when they began to wilt under the duress of full-court pressure. Newton scored 13 consecutive points in a 2:34-span to draw even at 57-57 with 1:01 remaining. Justin Herring forced the last of Eastside's four fourth-quarter turnovers six seconds later, allowing the Rams to play for what would be the game's final shot. Bradley's decision to press paid the ultimate

"You're down 20 ... you've got to get them out of their comfort zone," Bradley said. "We were able to take them out of it. They made some mistakes and started thinking everything was going wrong when we were thinking everything was going right."

The post-halftime collapse overshadowed what had been, to that point, a seamless performance from the Factors


Eastside went 10-for-16 from three-point territory in the first half, outscoring the Rams 20-7 in the second period. The Eagles went to the locker room with a 40-20 edge at the break.

"They dominated us in every way," Bradley said. "But the well ran dry, and it's a four-quarter game."

Jamario Vonner pumped in 13 points, ripped down seven rebounds and recorded six assists to pace four Eastside players in double figures. Marquis Gilstrap and Tyler Fisher pitched in with 12 points apiece, and Marchellius Smith chipped in with 11 as the Eagles saw their six-game winning streak and the momentum that surrounded it come crashing down around them.

White struck for 15 points, took down seven rebounds and had six assists for the Rams, who committed only five turnovers in the game. His night included a thunderous two-handed dunk off an offensive rebound in the first half, and he assisted on Scott's game-clinching lay-in.

Newton meets Salem at 7:30 p.m. tonight at Salem High School in Conyers. Eastside, meanwhile, challenges arch rival Loganville at 7:30 p.m. tonight at

Newton reserves pull their weight

Lett sparks bench in 56-20 victory

The Newton High School girls' basketball team earned some valuable minutes for its relatively untested bench Friday night.

Firing on all cylinders, the Lady Rams opened the game on a 37-0 run (with 35 of those points coming from the starting five) and left Eastside in their wake in a 56-20 win at Newton High School.

With his team in complete control from the second quarter on, Newton head coach Mike West used the opportunity to get his reserves some playing time.

"I think it was great for us," West said. "Some of those kids never get to play. We practice with 11 kids every day, and they bust their butts knowing they're not going to get to play much."

Newton's second unit more than held its own, accounting for 19 of the team's 21 second-half points. TeTe Lett struck for eight points and three steals, drilling a pair of three-pointers to spearhead the reserves. She moved the Lady Rams in front 52-9 with 6:18 to go in regulation when she knocked down a picture-perfect shot from beyond the three-point arc.

Takarie Belcher, Shanetria Hill, Nikki Sanders, Mya Speaks and Ivana Whitter also gave West a chance to look at his bench under fire, in the heat of battle.

"For them to go out and play the way they did, it was a great honor for them," West said. "You bide your time all season, and to play well when you get the chance means a lot."

With the region and state playoffs fast approaching, West now has a better idea of whom he can and cannot call on in the event of injury or foul trouble.

"Let's face it, right now you're going to go with seven or eight kids, whether you like it or not," West said. "They'll be better prepared when the time comes."


Nine different players scored for Newton, which extended its home floor winning streak to 15 games. Only Whitter did not score, but she pulled down three rebounds and had an assist.

The Newton bench accounted for nine of the team's 28 steals and six of its 10 assists. The reserves shot a respectable 7-for-18 from the field.

"You hear coaches all the time talking about how hard their kids work in practice," West said. "I really do have kids who work hard in practice."

Scott scored the gamewinner, splitting two defenders and converting a reverse lay-up with four seconds left in regulation as the Newton High School boys' basketball team downed Eastside 59-57 at Newton High School.

The game marked a drastic turnaround in fortune for Scott, who had failed to put Eastside away two weeks prior, missing the front end of a golden one-and-one opportunity at the foul line in the waning seconds of a 51-50 defeat.

This time, he did not miss his chance.

"I hit shots like that all the time in practice," Scott said. "I thought about going up strong with it, but something just told me to reverse it."

The 6-foot-1 senior scored six of Newton's final eight points, accounting for both the game-tying and game-winning baskets. He vividly remembers standing at the free throw line on Jan. 16 and watching Jamario Vonner streak down the court unmolested for a last-second hoop after his failed conversion.

"I was one of the reasons he hit that shot," Scott said. "I told myself it wasn't going to happen again. We wanted this one."

It was not to be.

Instead, I saw something I'd never seen before, and I've been attending, playing and coaching high school athletics for more than 40 years. Newton opened a 35-0 halftime lead on Eastside. I mean, I've never seen a high school varsity team shut completely out for an entire half of play, until Friday night. I still can't believe it.

West is a class act, though. He kept his starters in until Eastside finally earned two points in the third minute of the third quarter. He then pulled his starters and let his substitutes go the rest of the way. He could have really run up the score, but he's not like that. Plus, it will help down the road that his reserves got some playing time.

The boys' game got started soon after. Amazingly, Newton athletic director Tracey Curtis grabbed the microphone and made an announcement, directing fans to stay seated so that others behind them could see the

game. That pretty much was the dumbest announcement I've heard at any ball game in 40 years. Fans pay their money to come to the game and cheer for their team. If they want to stand up and yell, fine. If the folks behind them want to see, they can stand up, too. That's the way it's been ever since Dr. Naismith invented the game. I mean, if you want to sit, watch it on television.

Not long after that announcement, the entire second row of the Newton student section unfurled a 30-footlong sign which bore a tremendously negative message with sexual overtones, directed explicitly at the East-side girls. perpetrated the deed, nor do I care. The fact is that this kind of negative behavior has been consistently displayed by Newton kids toward East-side kids. It hasn't been stopped, and it needs to be.

I mean, if you're going to tell people they have to sit at a basketball game, surely you can tell them not to make and display offensive signs.

It will mean something different to every person lucky enough to have been there in person to see it. Some will see it as an unbelievable comeback by a team that led only once the entire game. Others will view it as a collapse of epic proportions by a team that seemingly had everything going for it. I guess I see it as a little bit of both.

Eastside played almost perfectly the first half. Tyler Fisher, Marquis Gilstrap, Marchellius Smith and Jamario Vonner combined for 35 of the team's 40 points — an incredible 30 of those points coming on the strength of 10 three-pointers — as the Eagles buried Newton under an avalanche of long-range shots. They led 40-20 at the half, having deliv-



ered what appeared to be the kill shot before the game ever reached crunch time. They had not.

Newton cut the margin to 10 ever so subtly by the end of the third period, and the Eagles slowly began to tighten up. Momentum left them. They felt what we felt. The Rams, once clearly out of it, were gaining steam, like a snowball barreling down a mountainside.

Newton outscored Eastside 21-9 in the fourth quarter (15-0 over the final 3:35), and Vincent Scott completed the turnaround with a nifty reverse lay-up in traffic with four seconds to go.

Perhaps it was only justice evening itself out. Scott, if you recall, failed to convert the front end of a one-and-one with 4.6 seconds left in the first memorable matchup between the two schools this season. The missed free throw led to a last-second lay-up that gave Eastside a 51-50 win.
