LOGANVILLE - It's 2 a.m. on a warm summer night in Loganville.

Robbie Nash feels like playing some basketball.

Who does he call?

His best friend since fifth grade. One of the only guys in the neighborhood who can challenge him, Wes Nash.

The one-on-one game goes on until the morning sun shines on the worn orange rim.

It's somewhat ironic that the pair of Loganville basketball stars would share a last name and much more a love of basketball, a friendship, a hometown — and vet be unrelated.

Wes moved to Loganville from Snellville while in the fifth grade.

Robbie had no rival in the Loganville vouth basketball leagues until his namesake arrived.

The two first became rivals, but then a friendship emerged and the duo looked forward to the day when they would wear the same uniform.

"We always liked playing

together because nobody could beat us," Wes said.

Only it didn't turn out that way at Loganville High School. The Red Devils suffered through several mediocre seasons.

But their senior season is turning out to be more like they envisioned it would be when the two were unbeatable when on the same side.

Legendary coach Ron Bradley has brought his winning ways (and more than 1,000 career victories) to Loganville and has led the Red Devils to an 11-1 record.

Loganville has competed in two tournaments and has walked away with the championship trophy both

And Wes and Robbie Nash are two reasons why the talk is justified.

"They are among the best players in the state," Bradlev said.

Robbie, a slashing, sharp-shooting 6-2 guard, is averaging 20 points per game and was recently named to the Atlanta Tipoff Club's All-State Team for December.

Wes, an explosive 6-1 forward, is averaging 16 points per game and prevents defenses from double-teaming Robbie.

The tandem's games, honed while playing against each other, now compliment the other.

"They're like coaches on the floor," said Bradley, who also knows the Nashes are the team leaders because, "they told me they are. And they accept that role well.

"We have some good young talent, but without their leadership, they wouldn't be as far along," Bradley

Both are as generous in attributing Loganville's success to its new coach.

"Coach Bradley has given us a lot of confidence," Robbie said. "He makes everything first class," Wes added.

As for future plans, both would like to play at the collegiate level, preferably together. Robbie hopes for a career in coaching and teaching while Wes contemplates pursuing a career as a chiropractor.


